Our volunteers continue to play a huge role in St. Catherine's. At a time like this they, along with our staff, deserve special recognition for their work in keeping our essential community services going in the face of the threat from Covid19. Without them services such as our Meals on Wheels could not have risen to the challenge of expanding our service to meet the rising demand for meals at the height of the crisis.

Our volunteers give their time and experience as Board members, in meals and wheels, after schools, counselling, reception and administration and parenting support. Working together with our staff, they are essential in ensuring we continue to provide the community services that people in Carlow need.

Note from the Director of Services

As we currently adapt to Covid 19 and the challenges it has thrown up for us as individuals, families and communities, 2019 now seems like a distant past fondly remembered but it was another busy year. Some of the key developments in 2019 included:

- The Carlow Syrian Resettlement programme finished in December. All 22 families are now settled and getting on well in Carlow, Tullow and Bagenalstown
- We recruited a Traveller Women's Awareness Worker as part of a pilot project supported by Pavee Point and Tusla
- We worked with 11 families in partnership with Carlow Library to encourage family reading and the use of the Library by all the family
- We invested in energy efficiency works to reduce our energy usage under the SEAI's Better Energy Communities programme





St. Catherine's Childcare Services

OVERVIEW OF OUR SERVICES:

- We operate community childcare services with full and part-time places in St. Catherine's from 9.15 – 5.30 and Kilkenny Road from 8.30 - 5.30
- We provide high-quality, child centred services that are affordable, inclusive and enable parents to engage in employment, training and work.
- We provide a safe stimulating space for all children to support them develop and reach their full potential
- At St. Catherine's, 22 places are available for wobblers and toddlers and 29 places for pre-school and ECCE children. In the afternoon we have 34 afterschool places available daily
- At Kilkenny Road Childcare Service, 22 places are available for wobblers and toddlers plus 33 places for ECCE/preschool in the morning and 16 in the afternoon.

OUTCOMES/SUCCESSES/ACHIEVEMENTS:

- 166 children from 154 families attended our 2 services
- 22 parents were enabled to engage in training and education in St. Catherine's and other training/education centres
- A Graduation ceremony was held in June for 50 children and their parents, guardians and families with 26 children transitioning to Primary School.
- 2 staff members completed FAR (First Aid Response) Training and 5 completed Paediatrics First Aid Training
- Our Manager and Assistant Manager completed Child Protection DLP Training
- Both services engaged with the Better Start quality assurance programme
- Practical advice and support were provided to parents
- 39 after schoolers were supported with their homework

EVENTS & ACTIVITIES

- Our services hosted an ice cream party and raised €166.93 for Down Syndrome Ireland.
- The children, staff and parents/guardians in Kilkenny Road raised €72.43 for Barnardo's by undertaking a Big Toddle Walk
- The Children's Christmas Parties were held in the Seven Oaks and the Kilkenny Road Service and was attended by the children, staff, parents/guardians and Santa.
- We had an end of year fun Day in June for all the crèche and preschool children









Community and Parental Education

Back to Education Initiative Community Strand

OVERVIEW OF PROGRAMMES:

LEARNING FOR EVERYDAY LIFE

A 28 week community education course that actively addresses the intergenerational cycle of educational disadvantage and poverty by offering to participants a positive basic holistic community education opportunity that is accredited and linked to progression. It ran from September 2018 until March 2019, Monday to Friday 9.45 am until 1 pm.

• PREPARATION FOR WORK

A part-time 10 week course that ran from April to June 2019, Monday to Friday, from 9.45 am until 1.00 pm. It provided participants with an opportunity to prepare for and gain experience in the labour market and to explore progression options while also achieving accreditation.

A key factor to the success of both programmes is in the intensive individual and family support given to participants

Community and Parental Education Community Education

OVERVIEW OF PROGRAMMES:

EVENING CLASSES

Facilitates access to short term community based adult education courses. It is low cost and accessible and gives participants a very good experience of their first step back into education. Courses included Yoga, Make Up & Nail Art, Healthy Eating and Nutrition.

DIGITAL SKILLS FOR CITIZENS PROGRAMME

Supports people to participate fully in Ireland's digital society by providing digital skills training to people who have never used the internet before. Classes can be delivered on a computer, tablet or smartphone.

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S GROUP

This provides a space for non-Irish women living in Carlow, who are experiencing isolation to come together. It is activity based and assists women to improve their English, develop friendships and skills while further integrating into the local community.

OUTCOMES/SUCCESSES/ACHIEVEMENTS:

- In 2019 over 721 learners participated in a variety of part-time courses.
- Digital Skills Internet and Email Courses 65 courses of 10 hours each were organised and 543 participants engaged in them.

Meals On Wheels

Our Service

- St Catherine's Meals-On-Wheels service provides hot nutritious meals to older people who are unable to cook for themselves allowing them to live independently in their own homes
- The daily visit from the volunteer delivering the meal also provides social contact for recipients helping to alleviate isolation while also monitoring their well-being.
- The service continues to service Carlow Town and two outreach services – the Alzheimer Unit in Bethany House and Leighlinbridge MOW's service
- The cost of the main meal and dessert is €5.50
- The service works closely with Public Health Nurses and GP's to ensure all meals meet client's dietary requirements



St Catherine's Meals on Wheels Service deliver meals 51 weeks per annum with a special delivery on Christmas Day

Outcomes and Achievements

- In 2019 Meals on Wheels cooked and delivered 18,092 meals
- The service caters for an average of 80 older people daily
- 6 kitchen volunteers completed Safe Food Ireland training
- At the end of 2019 we had 44 volunteers on the service
- The Service continues to work with Carlow Volunteer Centre to recruit Drivers and Cooks on the service. 12 joined in 2019
- The service operates a Birthday book.
 For Bealtaine, Delta Centre participants made birthday, thank you, anniversary and get well cards for our recipients
- A Community Garda Student volunteer joined the service
- Over 35 volunteers attended St.
 Catherine's Volunteer Christmas Party
- The service drop-in recorded 300 contacts in 2019
- St. Catherine's is member of the HSE Service Providers Forum and Carlow Age Friendly County Committee
- The service was promoted to the Bennekerry Active Retirement and Community Alert groups

Senior Alert Service (SAS)

What is the Senior Alert Service

- SAS is an alarm in the home that is monitored 24 hours a day ensuring older people in need can summon help instantly in emergency situations
- The alarm is worn as a wristband or pendant
- People over 65 with a landline or mobile can apply for the alarm
- St Catherine's coordinates the provision of the service in Carlow town, Tullow, Leighlinbridge and surrounding areas
- by people over 65 or their families and referrals are also made through Public Health Nurses, the Gardai and local Community Alert representatives

Making Connections

MAKING CONNECTIONS CARLOW

Making Connections is a KCETB funded Local Training Initiative (LTI) offering educational supports to individuals who have become distanced from mainstream education and training programmes. Participants are referred from agencies and support services that work with clients who are in recovery from addiction, substance misuse, transitioning from homelessness and linked with the Probation Services.

Making Connections supports recovery through education, raising competency levels and offering tailored flexible training. The unique element of the training is the 'one to one' delivery of the programme. Learners have the opportunity to complete QQI Level 3 nationally recognised qualifications.

THE CARLOW CATALYST PROGRAMME FOR

WOMEN

OVERVIEW OF PROGRAMME:

The Carlow Catalyst Programme For Women is a needs based countywide project aimed at increasing women's personal potential and ability to access and engage in employment, education and training. The Carlow Catalyst programme is specifically aimed at women not in paid employment, who are not registered as unemployed and who are interested in entering or re-entering the labour market. All programme actions are delivered through a partnership approach with representation from local community and statutory agencies.

Interested women can choose from a range of supports including:

- Ongoing advice, and support about future training, education or employment options
- Information on and links to relevant support agencies or services
- Non-accredited hobby and confidence building courses
- Basic computer skills training
- Job seeking and career preparation skills
- QQI accredited and work-related training and qualifications

OUTCOMES, SUCCESSES & ACHIEVEMENTS:

In 2019:

- **79** women enrolled with the Catalyst programme and engaged with the services and supports on offer
- 7 hobby courses were delivered in, Tullow, Borris and Carlow town
- 2 Preparation For Work Courses were delivered in Carlow town
- 2 ICT courses were delivered
- A wide variety of training/education and work related information sessions were provided to the different women's groups
- Adult guidance support was provided through KCETB's Adult Guidance service
- **52** QQI Level 3 component certificates awarded
- 35 Manual Handling certificates awarded
- 6 participants who finished in 2019 progressed to employment
- 18 participants who finished in 2019 progressed to further education or training

Teen Parent Support Programme

OVERVIEW OF PROGRAMME:

- The TPSP service covers counties Carlow, Kilkenny and South Tipperary
- The philosophy of TPSP is to offer a non-judgemental, non-stigmatising, holistic service to teen parents. We endeavour to be client led, flexible and creative in meeting individual needs.
- This is a targeted support service which focuses on specific areas of a teen parent's life in order to improve their overall outcomes in relation to parenting thus empowering them in their parenting role.
- Provide early interventions which are needs led and outcome focused, to enhance and support the wellbeing of all teen parents and their children.
- Support teen parents to remain in or return to education.
- Encourage existing services to work collaboratively in CW/KK/TS to respond to the needs of teen parents.

OUTCOMES, SUCCESSES & ACHIEVEMENTS:

- 51 teen parents engaged with the Carlow/Kilkenny/Tipperary TPSP 2019.
- 5 teen parents were supported to remain in secondary level education.
- 13 teen parents took up the service out of 26 new referrals received
- 8 came from Carlow, 2 from Kilkenny and 3 from Tipperary
- There were 12 mothers and 1 father:
- Source of referrals: 7 Midwife; 1 Self; 1 School Completion Programme; 1 St. Leo's; 1 Youth Worker; 1 Kilkenny Employment; 1 Carlow Youth Training Centre Employment
- 4 teen mothers and three teen fathers attended TPSP Antenatal Classes:
- 35 post primary schools visited biannually in Carlow/Kilkenny/Tipperary.
- 4 teen mothers went on to St. Catherine's Moving On Programme.
- Child & Family Work: TPSP worked with 8 Meitheal referrals in 2019.
- TPSP worked with Tusla Social Work to support 4 families
- TPSP continued to support families engaged in Barnardo's TLC KIDZ programme

Syrian Resettlement Project

OVERVIEW OF PROGRAMME:

22 Syrian Refugee families have resettled in Carlow town, Bagenalstown and Tullow since 2018 under a Resettlement programme led by Carlow County Council and overseen by an interagency committee.

The Resettlement team in St. Catherine's worked in partnership with local agencies and services to support families access state and community services and supports to assist the families settle and integrate into their local communities.

The Resettlement programme ended in December 2019 after 21 months of support. The families gained in confidence over the duration of the programme and can now access many services independently. St. Catherine's and other local agencies and services will provide on-going support to families in the areas of community and family support, youth services, education and training, health, befriending etc.

OUTCOMES & ACHIEVEMENTS:

- All 22 families are now settled in Carlow Each family is linked in to the individual essential services and supports they identified as needing
- Families are independently engaging with services including health, education, schools, childcare, etc
- Over 100 people attended a community cultural event in November which showcased Syrian food, music and dance
- 3 families took part in the Pride of Place competition with An Gairdin Beo. They cooked Syrian food and displayed artwork
- 17 families are linked in with local volunteer befrienders. This support will continue
- 1 member of the community graduated from IT Carlow with a Masters in Pharmaceutical Science. Another is in his third year in Chemistry in the IT
- 15 young people participated in summer camps with Carlow Regional Youth Services and 2 young people volunteered to help with other youth camps
- Many of the adults continue to progress with their English classes and other programmes with KCETB
- Women's groups were held in St.
 Catherine's Carlow and Forward Steps in Tullow and were well attended
- The families went on 2 social outings to Kilkenny Castle and the Discovery Park in Castlecomer









The Moving On Programme

OVERVIEW OF PROGRAMME:

The Moving On Programme aims to enhance the lifelong prospects of young mothers in County Carlow by enabling them to achieve inclusion in education, training, enterprise opportunities, the local labour market and their own communities. The main aims of the programme include:

- Enhancing the personal and social development of the participant
- The extension of the participants education and learning to enhance their life prospects
- Supporting the participants' parenting role and providing family support
- Engaging in advocacy and work to promote social change
- Raising aspirations
- Enabling young mothers to develop career pathways and progress to further education, training and employment

OUTCOMES/SUCCESSES/ACHIEVEMENTS:

- 20 learners started the 2018/19 programme, with 15 completing the programme in full
- Of those 15, 11 learners gained the overall QQI level 4 Major Award in Employment Skills
- In total there were **116** minor awards at QQI level 4
- 15 learners completed Manual Handling training
- 7 learners progressed into mainstream further education at QQI Level 5
- 2 learners secured employment after completing the programme
- The SOUL record measured significant improvements for all participants in their self-esteem, confidence and social skills

HIGHLIGHTS: ENTERPRISE PROJECT

Glamour glass mini company was a successful enterprise for the learners who sold all their product and even adapted their original concept to include personalised orders for special occasions such as weddings, birthdays and multicultural celebrations.











Story in a Box Programme

OVERVIEW OF PROGRAMME:

- Story in a Box was funded by Carlow Library Service and ran with over 30 families in St. Catherine's, Forward Steps Tullow and Bagenalstown FRC
- It is a community based family literacy programme aimed at non-library users
- Its aim was to get families to read together and to join and use their local library
- The programme was promoted directly in St. Catherine's and in other agencies in Carlow town
- 8 workshops were held in St. Catherine's and 2 in Carlow Library
- They focused on reading a common book, selecting a book for home reading and sharing and talking about their books with the group
- Families crafted items related to their book and made unique boxes for them
- Independent use of the Library was



"We loved it. It brought reading back into our home. Both me and my daughter started reading together and for ourselves. It was 2 hours a week just for us together. I could see the parents enjoyed it just as much as the children" – Parent

OUTCOMES/SUCCESSES/ACHIEVEMENTS:

- 11 families participated over 8 weeks in Carlow and included 10 mothers, 1 father and 16 children
- The group was made up of 7 Irish families including 4 Traveller and 2 Lithuanian, 1 English and 1 Pakistani
- All families joined the Library
- 10 borrowed books over the programme
- 3 families borrowed books 4 times
- 10 families attended a celebration in the Library and shared their experiences
- Interaction between children, parents and the facilitator was prioritised to ensure families enjoyed the programme
- A Storytelling workshop was held in Carlow Library
- Retention was high all 11 families completed the programme
- All families received book tokens at the end of the programme
- The programme was evaluated and reported Story in a Box "..ensured a total family experience that was dynamic, high energy and exploratory."

Other Services

Counselling Service

- St. Catherine's internal counselling service responds to the emotional needs of programme participants and service users
- Clients are referred by Programme Co-ordinators and Managers
- The service is delivered in conjunction with PCI College, Dublin and is managed by their Practice Supervisor
- In 2019 eleven people accessed approximately 75 hours of support

St. Catherine's Community Savings Club

- The CSC allows people save for upcoming items and events including Christmas, First Communion and back to school costs
- The aim is to encourage people to get into the habit of saving rather than borrowing, particularly from moneylenders and others offering high interest loans.

Access and Family Support Programme with Tusla Social Work

St. Catherine's entered into an agreement with Tusla to second two staff members to provide an Access and Family Support service to the Social Work Department in 2016

The programme provided 40 hours of support weekly to Social Work in 2019

The work includes:

- Facilitating and supporting supervised access visits between parents and children in care
- Providing family support to empower parents and enhance parental ability
- Linking families into support networks and community services

General Family Support



Family and individual support is widely provided to participants and service users accessing most St. Catherine's services and programmes. Support was provided for a wide range of issues including accommodation, domestic violence, child protection and welfare, access, education and rights and entitlements.

Intensive support is also provided to families with children in care. This support coupled with the increased confidence and self-esteem that parents derive from participating in community education improves parental capacity by building on the strengths of parents. This can prevent children going into care as well as helping children return from care to their families.

Tusla Meitheal Support for Families

- Meitheal is a TUSLA led national practice model to assist families to get the help and support that they need when facing challenges that are difficult to overcome
- A Lead Practitioner works with the family to identify their needs & strengths and to put a plan in place that requires one or more services

• St. Catherine's service is mainly provided by our TPSP staff team but other programme staff are also involved and lead on occasion

2018 Outcomes

- St. Catherine's engaged in Meitheals with 9 children and young people and their families in 2019
- Referrals came from the Tusla Child and Family Support Network Co-ordinator, Tusla Social Work, HSE Mental Health services, Carlow Youth Employment and self-referrals
- Challenges faced by families included behavioural and family relationship issues, educational challenges, mental health issues, addiction and parenting
- The families who engaged in Meitheals reported that they welcomed and valued the support
